

WELCOME

The 2016 – 2017 fiscal year was an eventful one for Bradford Community Church Unitarian Universalist. After the interim ministry of Lillie Henley came to an end with a vote to call a new, settled minister in May of 2016, the 2016-17 year began with apprehension and anticipation.

Rev. Erik David Carlson assumed duties as minister for Bradford UU on August 15th, 2016 and first began leading worship in September. As with any time of transition, there were many stories that came out of the last year, and many sides to each. This is particularly true regarding the several staff transitions which were a painful but unavoidable result of the changes the congregation is undergoing.

This report is reflective of some of those changes, being assembled and produced by the Bradford UU administrative staff. Reports submitted by members were only edited for format and not for content with the express intent of documenting some of the most important developments within the congregation for the 2016-17 church year. Some of the information contained herein includes the first two months of the 2017-18 year – but only when directly related to other work reflected in this report. We thank everyone for their contributions to this report but more importantly, to all the work on behalf of Bradford UU within and outside these walls in the last year.

The 2016-17 church year was full of transition as we welcomed our new, settled minister, Rev. Erik David Carlson. Rev. Erik began his service in August of 2016 after having been called unanimously the previous spring. Hitting the ground running, Rev. Erik performed 37 worship services between September and June, including Christmas Eve. In addition, Rev. Erik presided over two weddings and four memorial services.

Utilizing the materials from the Soul Matters Sharing Circle program that provide resources for worship based on monthly themes, Bradford UU explored a myriad of topics in worship ranging from social justice issues, UU history and theology, politics, current events and interfaith learnings.

Rev. Erik introduced multi-media presentations during worship using a new, flat-screen television for our sanctuary space purchased out of the Minister's Professional Expense account and used the screen for about a quarter of the services after its purchase.


The Worship Arts Team met monthly throughout the year establishing service topics, lay-leaders, music and religious education coordination for time for all ages and inter-generational worships.

Rev. Erik was installed in February during a spectacular Sunday worship service featuring the words of the Revs. Michael Tino, David Kraemer, Jim VanderWeele and Hope Engeseth, and the music of Jim Scott.

The Committee on Ministry met sporadically through the first year and offered Rev. Erik support on personnel issues, transition of organizational authority and social justice initiatives.

Upon arriving at Bradford UU, Rev. Erik set to working with the Board of Trustees and other leadership to streamline the official organizational chart and the chain of accountability for decision-making.

Approved by the Board of Trustees in January, the new organizational chart clearly sets the minister as chief of staff and establishes a boundary between the roles of volunteer leadership and paid staff.




Bradford UU Organizational Chart - Adopted January 2017

ATTENDANCE:

Nursery: The nursery had low attendance, with a maximum of two infants/toddlers in attendance on a Sunday. Many Sundays had no attendance in the nursery. We did hire a permanent nursery worker who has seen increased attendance over her tenure.

Pre-K – 4th Grade – Consistent attendance with an average of 3-6 children each week. Number of children varied each week. The highest attendance was 8 children on 4/24/16.

5th -8th Grade – Low attendance was a consistent problem. Average attendance was 0-3 participants. The Middle School class ended after the last week in March, and resumed in the fall.

High School – Attendance was not consistent, but averaged 2-4 participants. The highest attendance was 6 youth on 3/28/16.

CURRICULUM:

The curriculum for the following year was planned and discussed. The DRE, along with the RE Committee collaborated to decide on the next path to take with the next teaching model. The input from the congregation and parents will be considered and this will help to determine what curriculum will be used for the following year.

Pre-K – 4th Grade – The elementary class participated in a weekly curriculum that followed the monthly theme of the congregation, based on the Soul Matters Sharing Circle program. The children participated in a chalice lighting, story, and activity.

5th – 8th Grade – The middle school class utilized the Soul Matters Sharing Circle program as a basis for the curriculum. The monthly themes were incorporated into the weekly lessons.

High School - The high school class also utilized the Soul Matters Sharing Circle program as a basis for the curriculum. The monthly themes were incorporated into the weekly lessons.

Coming of Age:

The Coming of Age Program was discussed and the program was advertised to potential participants. The program schedule was set by the participants of the program. Start date TBD. determined.

WORSHIP:

Most Sundays, the children and youth started upstairs, and continued to their classroom after the Story for All Ages.

DRE planned with the minister and other members of the congregation for the Story for All Ages. Participated in reading stories to the congregation.

DRE assisted the youth and volunteers in planning programs and curriculum.

DRE worked with the minister for the Religious Education Volunteer Appreciation Service.

SPECIAL EVENTS/NEW PROGRAMS:

One significant new event is the monthly Religious Education potluck. This monthly event provides an opportunity for the families to build community. The event also occasionally includes a member of the congregation that does not have children. All are welcome to join and get to know one another better.

Other significant events sponsored by the RE committee include supporting the youth in attending the OWL program, beginning the Coming of Age program and Intergenerational Services led by the high school class. The children also enjoyed events such as the Easter Egg Hunt, and geocaching at Pringle Nature Center for Earth Day.

COMMUNICATION:

- Created bulletin board with information about the Religious Education Program including events.
- Sent out emails advertising special events and activities in the Religious Education Program.
- Wrote monthly Quilt Article for RE Program as well as Quilt Scraps as needed to advertise for events
- Met with the minister on a regular basis.
- Met monthly with RE Committee, provided monthly DRE Report before each meeting.
- Email, phone and in-person contact with families, church members, other executives and committee chairs as needed.

CHALLENGES:

Lack of classroom volunteer support is a challenge. The current rotation of teachers in the classes does not allow for adequate time off for volunteers.

Attracting families to BCCUU and having them stay despite follow up calls and emails.

Transition of minister made many decisions difficult and made planning for the future of the program difficult.

The nursery staff resigned, resulting in an increase of volunteers needed in the nursery.

FUTURE PLANS:

Increase attendance by advertising for the program.

Increase volunteers for classrooms to allow for a rotation that will provide adequate time off.

Join with other churches and groups in the area for activities and events.

Plans are not certain, due to transition with minister.

2016-17 Goals:

- 1. Reorganize administrative structure. Our new organization chart makes clear paid staff reports to and is supervised by the minister to free up members to serve church needs directly.
- 2. Develop a vision for Bradford. Used the Board Annual Retreat to develop a vision quest statement by forming small groups to respond to questions, then created a draft, and after holding two larger meetings, the Board and Minister revised a final draft of the vision quest: Living Spiritually, Leading Bravely, Loving Boldly.
- 3. Review and update by-laws. A committee was formed and changes are being reviewed. This is an ongoing process that will be completed next year.
- 4. Review governance and procedures. This follows the vision and by-laws and will be completed next year.
- 5. Increase member contact by Board Trustees. Every Sunday before service a Board trustee is greeting members.
- 6. Review and approve finance reports. Monthly the Finance Director presents finance's budget and the Board carefully reviews it.
- 7. Provided support for the stewardship campaign. Several trustees participated in the successful campaign to fund the church.
- 8. Find a new building manager. Unsuccessful hiring one, but Diane Guiles agreed to serve as temporary building manager. This has to yet be worked out with the budget.
- 9. Develop a strategic plan sometimes referred to as a 5-year plan. A Strategic Planning Committee was formed and is working on a plan. This is still in progress.

Significant Events & Contributions

- Board Annual Retreat was superbly lead by Robin Lester and Dawn Lingo.
- The several-month long visioning process resulted in our new Vision Statement
- The Board's work was constantly supported by our office manager BJ

- 1. Find a permanent building manager.
- 2. Enhance and involve congregation in awareness of Black Lives Matter.
- 3. Complete and engage congregation in a Strategic Plan for Bradford UU.
- 4. Replace the sound system.
- 5. Continue revising and updating the by-laws, policy governance, procedures, and executive limitations.

COMMUNICATIONS & TECHNOLOGY



In the fall of 2016, staff and volunteers working on communications made an assessment of the current BradfordUU.org website, publicity material, branding and nomenclature. In September, on behalf of the communications committee, Rev. Erik proposed the heart chalice he designed with his wife Kimberlee as the new official Bradford UU logo, for use on electronic and print media and for the new, lighted entry sign on 8th Avenue.

In addition to being added to church signage, the Facebook page, website and printed materials, the new logo featured prominently in the 2017 pledge drive and in the process that resulted in our new vision statement and now hangs in the sanctuary.

The new platform features an adaptable (mobile-friendly) design, easily updatable content, and integration with the Bradford UU Facebook page and Google calendar.

Under the new organizational chart adopted in January, design, management and maintenance of the website was transitioned to staff along with other elements of external communications.

Management of the Facebook page continues to be a collaborative effort among staff, volunteer moderators and Facebook users.

New online payment processing has been integrated into the new website using PayPal allowing members to pay pledges and give to different initiatives online.



MUSIC STAFF

In June of 2016, the contracts of Music Consultant Todd Greene and Church Musician Tom Shaughnessy were rewritten and renewed for the 2016-17 fiscal year. The Music Consultant and Church Musician were each responsible for performing and/or coordinating music twice a month, with fifth-Sunday music covered by Rev. Erik and other volunteer musicians.



Though the quality of music improved throughout the year, budget constraints and the untenable practice of alternating musicians (and musical styles) weekly compelled the Personnel Committee and the Board of Trustees to examine different arrangements moving forward.

It was decided not to renew the two music staff contracts in lieu of a single "Music Coordinator" position which would be responsible for providing music three Sundays a month and aiding with planning music for other Sunday services.

A wide-spread search for the Music Coordinator resulted in multiple applications for the position and the decision to hire Alex Poyner as the new Music Coordinator for the 2017-18 church year. Alex signed a one-year contract in August of 2017 and began his duties immediately to positive initial feedback.



Director of Religious Education

In January of 2016, then Religious Education Committee Chair Mary McKeown was named Interim Director of Religious Education (DRE) following the resignation of the former Director. Mary's interim contract was extended for six months in January of 2017 and the Personnel Committee, RE Committee and Rev. Erik began working on a new job description for the permanent DRE position.

After an extensive search that brought in several applications, the Personnel Committee hired Kenosha native, Pagan spiritual leader and horticulturalist Krystal Rose as the settled Director of Religious Education in August of 2017 to begin in September.

Child Care and Nursery

In the fall of 2016, after consulting with the Director of Religious Education, it was decided Bradford UU was in need of a permanent, professional child care provider to staff the nursery, thus relieving volunteers from this burden. The position of Child Care Staff was created and a search was undertaken by the Personnel Committee and DRE.

After a brief search, professional day-care provider Deonna Williams was hired to serve our nursery. Deonna ably served for the majority of the 2016-17 church year until personal, medical issues prevented her from continuing in the position.

Former Kenosha McDonald's manager Ashley Larsen interviewed and was hired for the position which provides nursery care for two hours each Sunday during service time.

ADMINISTRATIVE STAFF

Congregational Administrator B.J. Van Kammen's contract was renewed in June of 2017 and updated to provide an hourly wage increase as well as to more accurately account for the hours she works.





Mission Statement: To take action on timely local, national, and global social concerns and to inform and invite the congregation to participate in these actions. The mission, furthermore, includes raising congregational and community awareness of our actions, as well as those of other advocacy organizations and charities which address the same issues.

2016-2017 Goals

Goal #1: To provide ongoing support for the Shalom Center serving the homeless and hungry in the Kenosha area.

Since 1983, members of Bradford have served at the Shalom Center's soup kitchen every 4th Sunday. Jeff and Heidi Helgeson currently organize the soup makers and volunteers. Members and friends make the soup and staff the serving.

Bradford members no longer staff the INNS program since the guests are now served their evening meal and breakfast at the center. Several churches continue to house the guests overnight. The new permanent shelter is expected to house the INNS guests in the near future.

Red Sleigh Collection: Since 2005, Bea Lundgren has annually brought her red sleigh to church during December to raise money for the Shalom Center. In 2016 the congregation raised \$3768 which was matched by Barth Storage. To date the congregation has raised just over \$38,000.

Goal #2: To support Congregations to Serve Humanity (CUSH) through financial contributions and supporting their events and task groups.

Bradford offered financial support by sponsoring a full-page ad in the 2017 CUSH Yearbook. Other members submitted ads for the book. In a special spring collection, the congregation raised \$433.00 for CUSH and several members have joined as sustaining members.

Several members and Rev. Erik support CUSH by serving on task groups, the board, BCCUU Core Team, and the Religious Leader's Caucus (see complete CUSH report attached). In July many members participated in the March for Peace and Healing at the lake and in April the minister and members joined together for the Immigration Solidarity March which coincided with the arrival of President Trump. Many members attended the annual CUSH meeting in November, and the Madison Action Day 2017 in March, and the annual banquet in May.

Goal #4: To support the Unitarian Universalist Service Committee (UUSC) through Guest at Your Table program. Note that this special collection was not taken this spring but the \$150 BCCUU contribution was sent. A special collection for Haiti Relief was sent to UUSC after the hurricane caused mass destruction in Haiti.

In the fall of 2016, the social concerns committee was asked to consider displaying a Black Lives Matter banner on the church. After discussion with the minister, it was decided that further dialogue was necessary before making this decision. Under the direction of Rev. Erik with the assistance of gayle clark-taylor, over a dozen people have participated in three meetings to discuss this concern. Future discussion will be held in the coming year and those attending the General Assembly of the UUA will share what they learned through antiracist workshops and lectures.

2017-2018 Goals

- 1. To provide ongoing support for the Shalom Center serving the hungry and homeless in the Kenosha area.
- 2. To support Congregations United to Serve Humanity (CUSH) through financial contributions and supporting their events and task groups.

Significant Events

The full church year financial reports and budget were all developed through the Church Windows software. Complete reconciliation occurs monthly with the Quicken expenditure records. Marlene Tack and Katie Traxel are responsible for the smooth operation of these financial records.

An independent Stewardship Team ran the pledge campaign with leadership from Rev Erik and representation from the Board of Trustees and the Finance Committee. The overall average pledge increased by 20%.

The annual budget process produced a balanced budget with fully funded committee requests. The new budget begins repayment of the endowment loan, a long-time goal, some restructured personnel positions and a reduction in our UUA and regional dues. We await the association's new funding formula.

After an initial pilot last year, Marlene Tack almost single-handedly implemented the Scrip fundraising program which generated \$4,542 in new revenue. In other fundraising, the auction netted \$15,904, a concert raised \$1,317 and building use income was over projections at \$2,343.

Purpose – from Bradford UU Bylaws Section 2.C.1.

Purpose. The work of the church is strengthened through cash gifts, bequests, assignment of life insurance, and transfers of real, intangible and tangible property. Therefore, Bradford Community Church Unitarian Universalist (BCCUU) has established a separate Endowment Fund (Fund) to be administered, and its monies expended, independent of the annual operating budget. The purpose of the Fund is to assist the Church's mission in perpetuity and to promote long-term sustainability.

2016-17 Goals

- 1. **Meet 3-4 times:** The Endowment Fund Committee is tasked with meeting quarterly each year. We met six times from January through June.
- 2. **Meet with New Minister:** Each of our meetings included Rev. Erik
- 3. **Monitor funds until we reach our goal of \$10k:** Starting with \$7364.80 at beginning of church year we exceeded our goal with four additional out right contributions reaching \$10,759.05 as of June 30.

Significant Events and Contributions

- Every member of committee plus input of Rev. Erik helped get us past our \$10k goal.
- Began rewriting our policy to show a new goal of \$50k. The larger amount is needed help secure the long-term survival of the congregation.

- 1. Finish rewriting policy and submit to board of trustees
- 2. Invest all funds in the UUA Common Endowment Fund
- 3. Begin developing strategies for reaching the new \$50k goal.

The Stewardship Team sponsored a pre-canvass movie night featuring the showing and discussion of Ken Burns' documentary *Defying the Nazis: The Sharps' War* about the Unitarian couple who worked for the Unitarian Service Committee in Europe to save refugees during the holocaust.

The Stewardship Campaign was launched in February using the theme "Put your money where your heart is" and a full presentation on the proposed budget. Pledge cards were filled out with previous years' pledge amount and a suggested amount for 2017-18.

After six weeks of the campaign, the stewardship drive was considered complete raising nearly as much in pledges as last year from fewer pledge units.

After the campaign, additional pledges were recorded that brought us to the \$128,841 figure as reflected in the 2017-18 budget.


